Are you currently using or interested in using contraception...?



Contraception, sometimes called birth control, is a medication or device that can prevent the spread of a sexually transmitted infection (STI) and/or pregnancy. Certain methods can also be used to treat a range of medical conditions including absent or irregular menstrual periods, menstrual cramps, acne, PMS, endometriosis, Primary Ovarian Insufficiency (POI), and Polycystic Ovary Syndrome (PCOS).

Types of contraception...

- · Diaphragm and cervical cap
- Emergency contraception (sometimes called the morning after pill) - brand names include Ella, My Way, Plan B, and Take Action
- External and internal condoms (sometimes called "male" and "female" condoms)
- · Fertility Awareness (Rythym Method)
- Hormonal intrauterine device (sometimes called the IUD) - brand names include Mirena, Skyla, Kyleena, and Liletta
- · Implant brand name is Nexplanon
- Injection (sometimes called the shot) brand name is Depo-Provera

- Non-hormonal intrauterine device (sometimes called the copper IUD) - brand name is Paragard
- Oral Contraception (sometimes called the pill) brand names include Aviane, Camila, Loestrin, and Ortho Tri-Cyclen
- · Patch brand name is Ortho Evra
- · Ring brand name is Nuva Ring
- · Spermicide
- · Sponge
- Sterilization (sometimes called a vasectomy, tubal ligation, fallopian occlusion, or getting your tubes tied)
